Speaker Biographies:



Kimberley Monden, PhD, is an Assistant Professor and Licensed Psychologist in the Department of Rehabilitation Medicine at the University of Minnesota Medical School. She has 12 years of experience in spinal cord injury clinical care and research. Dr. Monden’s research focuses on psychosocial adaptation to injury, including resilience and appraisals of injustice. She has a specific interest in improving quality of life and long-term psychosocial outcomes after SCI. Dr. Monden has developed unique expertise in dissemination and implementation science via enrollment in a graduate certificate program at the University of Colorado Anschutz Medical School. She is the founder and director of the Spinal Cord Injury Psychosocial Outcomes and Wellbeing Research (SCIPOWeR) laboratory. Her contributions to the field have been recognized with the Division 22 Harold Yunker Award for Research Excellence and the Division 22 Rosenthal Early Career Research Award.



Angela Philippus, MS, is a Research Project Specialist II in the Department of Rehabilitation Medicine at the University of Minnesota Medical School. She has over 12 years of experience in spinal cord injury research. Ms. Philippus’ research focuses on identifying modifiable factors that contribute to psychosocial outcomes after neurologic injury. Ms. Philippus is currently pursuing a doctorate in clinical science at the University of Colorado Denver Anschutz Medical Campus with the goal of becoming an independent rehabilitation researcher. She has led or been a co-investigator on a number projects highlighting protective factors (i.e., volunteer activity, religious attendance, resilience) and risk factors (i.e., perceived injustice, perceived stigma) associated with psychosocial outcomes after traumatic brain injury and spinal cord injury.



Jane Duff, D. Clin. Psych, is a Consultant Clinical Psychologist and Head of the NSIC Clinical Psychology Department at Stoke Mandeville Hospital. She has worked in spinal cord injury rehabilitation for over 25 years providing direct clinical therapy, research, teaching/training and consultancy. Dr Duff is Chair UK and Ireland Spinal Injury Psychologists Advisory Group (SIPAG), European Spinal Psychologists Association (ESPA) and ISCoS Psychosocial Special Interest Group. She is an expert panel member on the SCI Development Group of the WHO Rehabilitation 2030 Package of Rehabilitation Interventions and a member of the ISCoS Psychosocial Dataset Group. Dr Duff’s research and publications concern coping and adjustment, appraisals, quality of life, rehabilitation/goal planning and promoting the development of self-management skills. Dr Duff holds a dual qualification as a health coach and works alongside the Back Up Trust, Spinal Injuries Association and Aspire in the UK to promote personalised care.
